

COURSE OUTLINE FOR THE BASIC AND INTERMEDIATE LEVEL BPA COURSES

Both courses are POST certified in Nevada.

LEVEL 1 - BASIC BLOODSTAIN PATTERN RECOGNITION COURSE (40 hrs)

This course contains a well-established curriculum; peer reviewed by experts in their own-right, all contained in a color enriched comb bound manual, and is designed to be used as a reference guide throughout one's career. It is ~ 235 pages in size.

More than a half ton of unique, singular-use experiment apparatus' have been designed and refined over the years to provide the best practical hands-on learning experience available.

This course is designed for the crime scene investigator and or lab personnel.

Theory and 16 practical exercises with mammalian blood solidify the attendees understanding of how blood behaves once outside the human body.

The curriculum takes into account the attendee has no background knowledge and is designed to discuss and explain the relative material leaving no one behind as the material progresses throughout the week.

This course is comprehensive in nature discussing the elementary principles in bloodstain pattern analysis.

LEVEL 2 - BLOODSTAIN PATTERN ANALYSIS DOCUMENTING – REPORT WRITING – PRESENTING (40 hrs)

The primary goal of this intermediate level course is to build upon the attendee's skill set at the crime scene by way of incorporating best practices for note taking and photography. This information is presented in a BPA report. With the report in hand the attendee may need to testify to its contents. This articulation will be assisted by way of their own personally created demonstrative aid illustrating the theory behind 2-D and 3-D spatter pattern analysis.

In order to meet this goal the following objectives will be made:

- A renewed BPA awareness of theories and terminology
- Correct photographic techniques
- Layout and design theory for a solid, court acceptable BPA report
- Practical elementary bloodstain pattern experimentation/creation (demonstrative aids)
- Creation of a spatter pattern model to illustrate and explain 2D & 3D aspects
- Opportunities to speak publically on theory before a group who know the theory

On Friday the course is wrapped up by a local prosecutor who attends the class. The ADA questions and interacts with the attendee in a safe learning environment, being the classroom and not the courtroom.

Both courses will be taught in at the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, Crime Scene Unit.

Registration cost is \$550.00 per person per course.

The Basic (Level 1) Course is **March 27-31, 2017**

The Intermediate (Level 2) Course is **April 3-7, 2017**

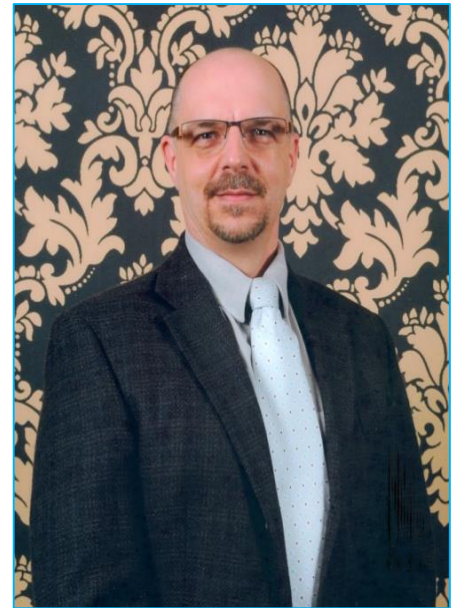
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BIOGRAPHY

Craig Moore is a 30 yr police veteran (ret. January 2015) from Ontario Canada with 16 years experience in the Forensic Services Unit. He has studied Bloodstain Pattern Analysis (BPA) at a serious level since 1997 and continues to do so today. He is currently involved in his second DOJ grant funded research project emanating from the Mechanical Engineering Dept., Iowa State University, Ames Campus.

He has been published over ten times and given in excess of 150 presentations on the topic.

Early on in his BPA career he conceptualized and designed a 3D model of a blood drop in flight and its subsequent impact angle stain. This model received design patents in both Canada and the United States.

He is certified as an IAI Bloodstain Pattern Examiner and is also a Distinguished Member. He has sat for 12 years on either the IAI's BPA Certification or BPA Educational Sub-Committee Boards.

In 2006, he conducted his first one week course in BPA. To date he has been involved in over 30 such courses.

He has a baccalaureate in Criminal Justice, Hilbert College, Hamburg, New York, where once earned he taught numerous courses as an Adjunct Instructor (2005-2011).

Currently, he is POST certified as a (civilian) Police Instructor in Connecticut and is a member of faculty at Syracuse University, NY.

He has testified numerous times and been deemed a subject matter expert in the criminal courts of Ontario, New York State and once in a tribunal conducted by the Canadian Armed Forces.

His Basic or entry level BPA course has been reviewed and is approved by both the IAI and the IABPA. The ABMDI recognizes his basic BPA course for continuing education hours.

His Basic and Intermediate BPA courses are also POST certified in Nevada.

In July 2015, he instructed his first Advanced level BPA course at the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department's Crime Scene Unit with co-instructor Dr. D. Attinger of Iowa State University, Ames campus.

Craig considers himself first and foremost as an educator in the field of Bloodstain Pattern Analysis.
